Phi Sig in the News

As you have probably heard, Phi Sig was suspended for a short period of time this semester. We've had to keep things close to the vest while the investigation played out, but we are happy to report to you that the incident investigation is nearing an end. In short, the allegations were found to be nowhere near

as egregious as reported. The active chapter brothers filed the report to the State College Police Department within 24 hours of learning of the allegation and cooperated fully with them. This was one of the fastest reported incidents at the University in recent memory - many take weeks to be reported.

The State College Police Department detective noted that in his 25 years of service, he had never had more cooperation from a fraternity than he did on this case. The

IFC suspended the chapter for 2 weeks for "related" violations of social policy, and they were successful in working out a mutually satisfying agreement at their judicial board hearing last week. The allegations were brought against

a male guest of one of the brothers, and no brothers were involved.

We are very proud of the swift action that the brotherhood took to report the incident and work with the SCPD to complete a successful investigation.

We are also engaging with the University Task Force that has been established to review the Greek system. As proud alumni and concerned parents, we want the Greek experience we had to be reinvigorated and to be as beneficial to current members as it has been for many of us.

The news is nothing but good for Phi Sigma Kappa. We are facing a bright future, and so are the Men of the Year and the Phi Sig Superstars. All is well in Happy Valley.

Chapter Report

Kappa Chapter Actives Improve Lives of Others

This year the active members of Kappa Chapter have had a rather full plate. This past fall we inducted 18 quality members to join the ranks of our brotherhood. Meanwhile this spring we have six quality associates who are currently earning their way into the house as they learn about both our tradition and rituals.

Kappa Chapter has also made many strides within the community this year breaking our personal fundraising record for THON with a grand total of \$51,478.15. Thanks to our strong total, we have managed to secure a THON partner with sorority Phi Sigma Rho for THON 2016.

I joined the Air Force in 1971 and spent 21 years as an aviator (pilot) in fixed-wing fighter aircrafts like F-111, F-15E Strike Eagle. I spent my first tour in Southeast Asia during 1972 flying combat missions in Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia. What a hoot!

When I came back to the states, I served as a platform, simulator, and flight instructor. I survived and eventually flourished, going from a robust 225 pounds to a skeletal 136 pounds. ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Andrew Herdman '92: I Was Very Lucky To Become A Phi Sig



This month, we got in touch with **Andrew Herdman '92** via email for an interview. He was able to tell us about a very unique and touching experience he had through the Phi Sig.

Why did you choose to join Phi Sigma Kappa as opposed to other fraternities at Penn State?

Phi Sigma Kappa was truly a bunch of good guys who genuinely enjoyed and cared for one another. There

was no pretense or arrogance, but there was also no mistake that it was a house full of real leaders. There was a Phi Sig in nearly every significant leadership role on campus-- including IFC and Dance Marathon. While I was there, two brothers chaired Dance Marathon (Marc Hourvitz and Tom O'Keefe) during the period when it really broke out and eclipsed the 1 million dollar mark. At the same time, our own philanthropy Phi Sig Superstars was the largest philanthropy in the country sponsored by a single fraternity. We were also honored with the Chapter of the Year Award by the national fraternity. As I look back, it is clear we were among the strongest fraternities on campus--by any standard: academics, campus leadership, athletics, the social aspect, and the strength of friendships. It seemed to me to be a pretty special time in the history of the fraternity and I was very lucky to have found Phi Sig.

Would your life be different today if you didn't join Phi Sigma Kappa? Why or why not?

First, I would be deprived of a lot of great memories and friendships. I also think I discovered things about myself, including some difficult lessons, that wouldn't have been possible in another context.

Where has life taken you since your graduation day from Penn State?

I married Jennifer and we have three children—Anna (9), Jamie (7) and Ben (5). Our wedding was thick with Siggers, including Marc Camaratta and Matt Vergamini who were in the wedding. Professionally, I spent 12 years working for a Pennsylvania based real estate development company, eventually assuming leadership of the Human Resource and, later, the Business Development functions. Along the way, I discovered I enjoyed the training and development portion of my job the most and fell in love with teaching as an adjunct faculty member for a few local colleges and Universities. So, I decided to pursue my Ph.D. in Management/Human Resources, which I completed in 2008. I took a faculty position at East Carolina University in 2007 and spent 8 years teaching, researching and consulting in the areas of leadership and human resources. I decided to leave academia shortly after receiving tenure and returned to industry in 2014. I am currently serving as VP of Human Resources

for Mayne Pharma.

If you had to go back and relive one of your past moments at the fraternity, what would you relive and why?

It is hard to isolate one—summers living in the house, canning trips to D.C., the dumb game, dinner at Bear's house, Grave Diggers, pledge bolts, and Superstars all come to mind. But the memory that makes me laugh the hardest is when I think of it is the trial we held for a (unnamed) brother who was alleged to have committed a variety of "crimes" against the brotherhood-- with the honorable Kevin Brady presiding (in white wig and bathrobe), Marc Camaratta as his trusted Bailiffs and Eric Nanda (The Urban Commando) emerging from the witness protection program in full disguise to serve as the star witness for the prosecution. Justice was served and the sentence was swiftly administered in the sump pump.

Is there any particular day in the house/brother in the house that really sticks out to you as a more poignant moment/person? In other words, is there any day/person that had any sort of influence on you coming out of college/your college days?

My father passed away my junior year. One of my strongest memories was the response of the brotherhood-- they showed up in force in my hometown a couple hours away. I remember feeling pretty overwhelmed and unbelievably lucky to have that kind of support and love. I still get a warm feeling when I remember looking up and seeing them file into the funeral home.

Of course, I also remember the impact of the late Robert "Bear" Koehler, Ph.D. who faithfully served the fraternity for so many years. I am certain that every Phi Sig who was lucky enough to have him as an advisor will smile when they think of him.

What would you say is your life's mission?

I try to leave people, places and things better than I found them.

Do you keep in touch with other brothers? Are there any particular brothers you would like to hear from?

Occasionally, there will be talk of a bunch of us getting together but it rarely goes very far, with the complexities of kids and jobs. We need to get together soon. If anyone is interested, reach out.

What advice would you give to the actives currently in the chapter?

Protect the good name and traditions of the Phi Sig brotherhood at Penn State. With recent high profile events involving fraternities at Penn State and elsewhere, good judgment and integrity are more critical than ever. Also, realize that the challenges that fraternities bring, including dealing with diverse personalities, budgets/finances, and learning to work together are very similar to those you will face the rest of your life. More importantly, if you do it right, you will discover the importance of a shared purpose, honesty and leading by example as critical determinants to the difference you will make in your life and careers.
